The delegates' meeting

The last delegates' meeting was held at Ockbrook on Saturday 28th October under the able chairmanship of our new man Frank Cooper. Also new in post where secretary Alan Budd and treasurer Maureen Stephen.

The four societies currently benefiting from **loans** from the association had all made partial repayments, and the finances were looking in good order once again.

Our **insurance** broker made his report, which is confidential to club officers, but all appears to be in good order on this front also, and delegates were pleased to hear that premiums would be held at their present level for a further year.

Former treasurer Frank Stephen is now representing us on the British Model Engineering Liaison Group and he reported on the latest situation regarding the boiler code. An extension to the code to accommodate operating practice for the larger model boat boilers has been drafted and this is currently with the insurers for approval. Boilers under the 1.5 bar litre limit are exempt from the test regime but are nevertheless covered by the insurance scheme. The entire code will be reviewed

over the coming year with a view to resolving the various difficulties stemming from it, and any further observations on the operation of the code as it now stands should be forwarded to Frank Stephen. Frank confirmed that the many observations and comments already registered would be carried forward and there is no need to register them again.

It was announced that the next **NAME rally** will be held at Chesterfield on a date to be announced. It will be Chesterfield's 75th anniversary next year, and the rally will form part of the club's celebrations. A number of suggestions were made for subsequent rallies, coinciding with 'significant dates' for the clubs concerned.

The Narrow Gauge Efficiency Competition will be held at Oswestry over the weekend of 23-24th June, venue for the first such competition ten years ago. Glyn Davies of the host club handed out posters and entry forms and he urged delegates to promote the event in their He also proposed some changes to the competition rules to mitigate the situation whereby the winners tended to come from a small group of the more powerful locomotives originally built for overseas use, whereas the competition was originally conceived for the smaller type of quarry locomotive used in the UK.

The association's constitution calls for it to hold an **exhibition** every three years or so to promote the hobby and to serve as a showcase for the work of the association. A possible venue has been found at Bakewell in Derbyshire, a fairly central site nationally and a significant centre of tourism in the Peak District, and it was agreed that this option be pursued further for an event in 2008.

A bequest from the estate of the late David Birkett has offered the association an annual prize to the value of £100 for a Model Engineer of the Year award. It was agreed that this be accepted and augmented from the association's own funds, and that the criteria for the award be broadly drafted so as to include the maximum possible range of involvement in the hobby, given the small numbers of youngsters involved. The age limit would be set at 25yrs. Entries for the first year's award should be posted or emailed to the chairman:
